For the visitor who wants to experience the city's traditional charm with a stay at a historic bed and breakfast, there are many from which to choose. Two standouts, **The Presidents' Quarters**, situated in two Federal mansions (circa 1860s), and the **Ballastone Inn**, a four-story antebellum mansion built in 1838, offer guests the glamour and style of a bygone era along with top-tier modern-day amenities. Historic inns, like the **Hilton Savannah DeSoto**, which has been welcoming guests for over a century, and the **Inn at Ellis Square**, situated in the historic Guckenheimer Building, afford guests the luxuries and convenience of a modern hotel in a timeless setting. Contemporary hotels like the **DoubleTree** and the **Hilton Garden Inn** offer guests unrivaled, affordable accommodations in the city's best locations. And soon to join the ranks of

Savannah's top lodging offerings are two super-chic boutique hotels, **AVIA Savannah** and **The Bohemian** (whose sister hotel, the inspiringly avant garde **Mansion on Forsyth Park**, has been thrilling visitors for years).

When it comes to dining, Savannah is so much more than shrimp and grits or biscuits and gravy (though you're sure to find the best Southern cooking there). Chef Chris Nason's **Sapphire Grill**, which features fresh-caught seafood, organic free-range meats, vegetables and herbs from local farms, and organic heirlooms and wild foods from custom growers and gatherers nationwide, has enjoyed critical and popular acclaim since its opening over a decade ago. Two legendary Savannah establishments, **Elizabeth on 37th** and **The Pink House**, continue to draw crowds of locals and visitors, with their unpar-

leled culinary offerings. And, though it might come as a surprise to some, Savannah boasts dozens of amazing ethnic restaurants, from Indian and Italian to Moroccan and Thai.

And while no trip to Savannah would be complete without a tour, there are far more ways to see the city than aboard the traditional horse-drawn carriage, and one of the most innovative and exciting is geocaching. Geocaching is a high-tech treasure hunting game played around the globe by adventure seekers equipped with GPS devices. The idea is to locate hidden containers, called geocaches, and then share your experiences online. Dozens of caches are located in and around the Savannah area, affording players hours of fun and a novel way to experience the city.
